From the Rector

“Greetings, favored one! The Lord is with you.” I mused the other day what it would be like to be greeted with this upon entering a friend or family’s home for Christmas dinner. It is not the usual greeting we make in our day to day lives. Depending on how it was being said, and by whom, I might be bit perplexed and my defenses might rise up a notch. It would be one thing if someone I was close to greeted me as such (even more perplexing?), and quite another if a complete stranger said this, particularly one who had the appearance of an other-worldly being, such as an arch-angel. Yet, despite my questioning, it is ultimately most comforting. I receive as much during worship with that simple exchange, “The Lord be with you...and also with you.”

Of course, this is the greeting Mary received from the Archangel Gabriel. She

was perplexed and pondered in her heart what sort of greeting this was. “Do not be afraid, Mary,” Gabriel reassured her, for you have found favor with God.” (Luke 1:30) The announcement of what was to happen to her became even more wondrous, mysterious, joyful and expectant. All to which she responded, “Here I am, a servant of the Lord: let it be with me according to your word.” Mary is a model for us all.

This season of Advent is a time of wonder, mystery, and joyful expectation, a time to prepare for the “coming of the Lord.” We hear again the message of the Angels, “and in heart and mind to go even unto Bethlehem, to see the Babe lying in a manger.” (From the Bidding Prayer for Advent Lessons Carols). We come again to the stable and the manger – a lowly, humble and ordinary place – to be swept up in the awe of creation, of new birth, and the light of divine life. Advent and Christmas are seasons to prepare and marvel in the presence of God with us.

There is much to be uncertain and perplexed about these days: our evolving natural environment, political differences and rancor nationally and globally, an uncertain economic climate. Yet, as always, there is much hope, life and comfort. In ordinary and exalted places, may each of us hear and bear the words: “Greetings, favored one! The Lord is with you.”


ABOUT THE MUSIC

Music has long been important to the people of Saint Michael's Church in Marblehead. This historic church, founded in 1714, has led the way in New England by being the first to observe Christmas Day as a religious holiday in 1728 (as opposed to a day of carousing and shooting off small arms). It was also the first church where Anglican chanting of the morning canicles took place, in 1767. The "Singing Gallery" was added in 1764, and has housed an organ since then. The current instrument is a Charles B. Fisk organ of 21 stops, made in Gloucester, MA in 1974, and situated in an 1833 Hook organ case. The acoustics in the wood and plaster building are excellent for music of all kinds, especially singing. One only needs to attend a Sunday service to enjoy the enthusiastic singing of the Holy Eucharist and the hymns by the congregation, the choir and our many visitors. The music you hear on this recording is a collection of favorite hymns and anthems of the St. Michael's Choir, and spans four centuries of choral music.

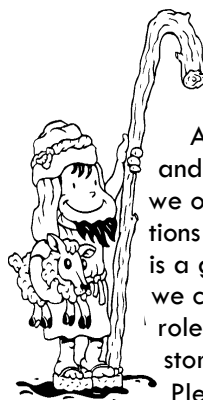

Stewards of the Month: Susan Butterworth

Susan Butterworth's grandmother was a member of St. Michael's, but Susan was raised as a Unitarian. In the eighties, however, she joined St. Michael's. She says, "It was the choir and the liturgy that brought me back."

Her St. Michael's memories include her son's baptism and the blessing of her marriage. She remembers her son's Church School years with the Christmas pageant and the Good Friday luncheons of vegetable soup and hot cross buns. She led a book discussion group for a while and she remembers fondly ringing the church bell. "I've done a cajillion receptions over the years," she laughs.

The choir, though, remains a mainstay of her life at St. Michael's. Sitting in the choir gallery, she says her mind naturally reflects on the collects. And, singing with the choir makes her aware of the liturgical year and she has grown to love the songs of each church season. Even after her husband Richard died in 2003, Susan processed that Sunday with the choir. "I had tears on my face, but that was where I had to be," she says.

Susan's spiritual life is broad. In February she took part in an interfaith trip to Israel, an experience she recently shared with St. Catherine's Guild. Growing up in Clifton, she attended temple services with friends as part of her social life. "I like to explore the connection between the Abrahamic religions," she says. Susan also attends Emmanuel in Boston. She likes the music, and the urban



environment is a change she enjoys. And, for a few Christmas Eves, she has sung at Old North.

With a degree from Tufts in French and Political Science, Susan was an accountant for 20 years, but then earned a Master's degree in English from Salem State University. Currently she is an adjunct professor at Salem State University where she also sings in the Women's Chorale. For two years, she taught eighth grade English at the Marblehead Veterans' Memorial Middle School. However, she left in June when she decided to enroll at the Episcopal Divinity School in Cambridge. She will work on a Master's of Arts in Theological Studies, beginning in January. "I love Cambridge and I love to study, research, and write," she says of her new venture. She will continue to write as a freelancer of reference articles and supplemental materials for literature texts. "I am nothing if not eclectic," she says.

One reason she likes Cambridge is that her son Eli and his wife live there. Eli, who has a degree from Montserrat, works at the Museum of Fine Arts in Boston. He is also working on a graduate degree from Harvard Extension. His field is interactive design.

Susan sums up her experience at church, "St. Michael's has been the most important place in my life. It is my parish family and my spiritual home."

Wassail and Good Health

Wassail is an old English tradition for drinking and wishing health to others on festive occasions, such as Christmas and Twelfth-night. No proper Yule celebration would ever be complete without a steaming cup of Wassail to warm the chill of night whilst encircling the bonfires.

Wassail, pronounced wossayl or wossal, is the spice holiday drink of Yule against which the custom of wassailing surrounds. To paraphrase, wassail is more of an event than any mere refreshment, and its origins can be traced back hundreds of years. Popular in Eastern Europe and the UK, the term 'wassail' is a contraction of the Gaelic phrase 'Waes Hael' which translates to 'Good Health'. Interestingly enough, traditional wassailing still takes place

today in many areas of the UK and is considered an extremely important ritual for the benefit of the apple harvest as well as to ensure the health of the local economy.

Recipe for Wassail:

1 cup sugar	3 lemon slices
1 4" cinnamon stick	1/4 cup water

Heat/stir 3-5 minutes until sugar dissolves. Do not boil.
Remove fruit. Add:

6 cups red wine (one 1.5 liter jug)
2 cups unsweetened pineapple juice
2 cups orange juice
1 cup dry sherry (1/3 bottle)

Serve hot. Wassail!

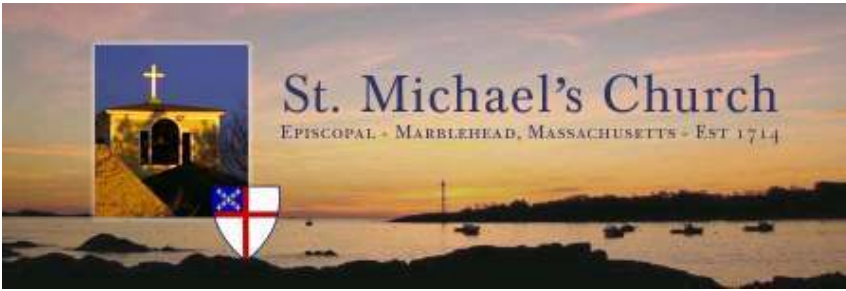
