My summer reading included two books that featured Marblehead. One was from Robert Parker's "Jesse Stone" series. Jesse Stone is the chief of police in a fictional town named "Paradise." Parker used Marblehead as the setting for the series. The irony – no coincidence in Parker's choice for the name - is that even in "Paradise" crime, broken relationships, and questionable behavior goes on. Fortunately, Jesse Stone is around, gets the bad guys and sets things right. (A confession: I read two books from this series. They are real page-turners!)

The other book was *General John Glover and his Marblehead Mariners*, by George Athan Billias. A parishioner loaned me this book last spring after I read *The Hearth and the Eagle*, by Anya Seton. "General John Glover" was not the page-turner of the Jesse Stone books. It did, however, provide some wonderful insight regarding Marblehead in the mid to late 18th century and the War for Independence.

St. Michael's Church was not mentioned in either book, but the parish was never far from my thoughts as I pieced together contemporary locales and discovered historical settings. Parishioners and friends have mentioned how the town has developed over the years. The same could be said about St. Michael's. Over the past 300 years the parish has enjoyed times of prosperity and times of great, even severe, financial concern. Not to mention the late 1770's when the Rector, the Rev. Joshua Weeks and many members of the parish were Tories and avowed loyalists: the

doors to the church were shut tight for a number of years at that time.

Each generation in the church brings its own understanding of the good news of God's love in Jesus Christ. What a gift it is to be entrusted with this ever revealing faith at this time. Through the grace of God and ministry of the church, we are brought into the stewardship of our spiritual lives and community, "that we may love and serve with gladness and singleness of heart."

Each generation also has its challenges. One serious issue we face now is financial: we are spending too much of our endowment to run the parish. We greatly value our worship and music, education, outreach and other ministry programs. Continuing to utilize the principal of our endowment to meet operating costs means our endowment will eventually vanish in the years to come and with it programs we cherish.

The Vestry and the Stewardship Committee are dedicated to improving stewardship of the parish by seeking a balanced budget and a proscribed endowment withdrawal over the next three years. This will take the resources of every person in the parish. This fall you will hear more of how you can further participate in the stewardship of St. Michael's. Rest assured, such engagement leads deeper into the spiritual well-being God desires for us. It also allows the spiritual and physical assets of our parish to be a resource for generations to come.

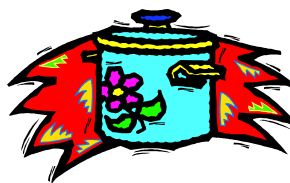
St. Michael's Thrift Shop Fall Goods Needed!

Narthex—New Look and a New Cross



The narthex of St. Michael's is the small hall that one enters through the red front doors on Summer Street. It has a new look! The first thing you may notice is that the large board listing the Rectors and their dates of service has been moved to the nave (inside of the church!). A cross with the risen Christ now greets visitors and parishioners upon entering the church.

There are a few details to notice on the cross. Jesus is there with arms outstretched. A crown signifying his reign as "King of kings, Lord of lords" sits on his head. It is not a crown of thorns, however. Note that there are no nails in his hand or feet, and that he is "vested" - he is adorned in robes (vestments) rather than a scant cloth around his loins. Note, too, that his eyes are opened.

All this symbolizes his resurrection. Christian faith is grounded in Christ's resurrection. By him and in him we are lifted with him to everlasting life. This invitation greets people to St. Michael's.

This cross was gift to the parish by Fr. Andrew at his installation as Rector on Sept. 29, 2005, the Feast Day of St. Michael's and All Angels. It was given to Fr. Andrew by his friend, the Rt. Rev. Ian Douglas, now Bishop of Connecticut, who had in turn received it from the clergy and laity of Haiti many years ago. Bishop Douglas had spent much time in Haiti and played a role in helping St. Michael's establish its partnership with St. Thomas, Archaie nearly thirty years ago.

A new bulletin board, a repositioned table, and fresh paint also add to the invitation to enter St. Michael's. New lighting will be added at a later date.

Our Steward of the Month: Tom Connolly

Tom and his wife Milena and children moved to Marblehead in 2004. Looking for a church home, Tom said of St. Michael's, "Initially the attraction was the history. And this summer, he, along with Trevor, 9, Miranda, 7, and Clive, 3, helped ring the church bell for the Fourth of July. "The guys in the Bell Bunch are terrific," he said.

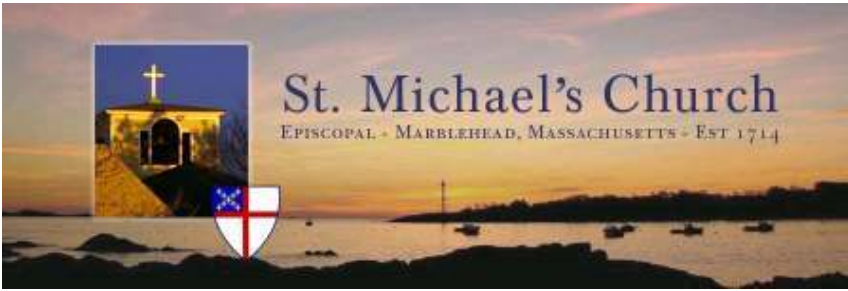

He wants to write another book, but not an academic one, one for a general audience about how culture really works.
